<i>The Egyptian Cinderella</i>	<i>Shirley Climo</i>	The Egyptian Cinderella takes the familiar story of Cinderella and transports it into the context of Ancient Egypt. Rhodipis is an orphaned slave girl from Greece, whose red slipper ends up in the hands of the Prince of Egypt. Follow her story as the Pharaoh searches for Rhodipis and makes her the Egyptian Queen.
<i>Pharaoh's Fate</i>	<i>Camille Gautier & Stéphanie Vernet</i>	This is a visually appealing and beautifully illustrated non-fiction text that explores life in Ancient Egypt. Someone is plotting to murder the pharaoh and this book walks the reader step by step through Egyptian life to investigate the clues. This is the kind of non-fiction text that children want to look at again and again.
<i>An Egyptian Adventure (The Histronauts)</i>	<i>Frances Durkin & Grace Cooke</i>	This is a really engaging book that is a fun hybrid between graphic novel, activity book and information text. The story, told in graphic novel form, follows a group of friends who travel back in time and explore life in Ancient Egypt. At various different points in the story there are relevant puzzles, fact boxes, activities and project ideas. This book has a high visual appeal and is a great addition to your library of Egyptian topic books.
<i>The Story of Tutankhamun</i>	<i>Patricia Cleveland-Peck & Isabel Greenberg</i>	This award-nominated book tells the story of Tutankhamun. The text explores the story of Tutankhamun's life (or what is known of it) and, in more detail, the story of Howard Carter's discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb and its legacy. The text is accompanied by bold, cartoon-like illustrations that both engage the reader and add a visual dimension to the facts presented.
<i>Meet the Ancient Egyptians</i>	<i>James Davies</i>	This is a really engaging non-fiction text about Ancient Egypt. Each page has a short chunk of text accompanied by simple, bold illustrations or infographics. We like the way this book is presented in a way that appeals to reluctant or younger readers without compromising on factual content.
<i>Ancient Egypt: Tales of Gods and Pharaohs</i>	<i>Marcia Williams</i>	Marcia Williams returns with her distinctive comic-book style to present exciting tales from Egyptian mythology. These stories have plenty of humour and a great visual appeal, proving particularly popular for engaging reluctant readers.
